

## SOUTHEASTERN IDAHO

Southeastern Idaho contains the state's oldest town, most of Idaho's famous potato fields, and the greatest habitat diversity. The Intermountain Semidesert, Middle Rocky Mountain, and Southern Rocky Mountain Ecoregions all meet in southeast Idaho. This fortuitous joining makes Big Days of >160 species possible. Within a few hours drive of Pocatello or Idaho Falls, a birder can watch huge flocks of Snow Geese at Market Lake WMA (spring), listen to Virginia's and Black-throated Gray Warblers along Mink Creek (summer), or sort through hundreds of shorebirds on The Bottoms (fall). Southeast Idaho also contains most of the state's colonial nesters, with thousands of Western and Clark's Grebes, Snowy Egrets, White-faced Ibis, and Franklin's Gulls breeding. Because of the great habitat diversity, most of Idaho's bird species can be found in the Southeast, the exceptions being a few northern species such as Boreal Chickadee, and a few peripheral species such as White-headed Woodpecker.

Great natural beauty also brings visitors to Southeastern Idaho. Recreational options include touring Yellowstone National Park, flyfishing the world famous Henrys Fork, or gawking at the power of Mesa Falls. Services are relatively easy to find, especially in Idaho's second and third largest cities (Pocatello and Idaho Falls).
